



1. What insight, principle, or observation from the message did you find most helpful, most challenging, or most troubling? Please explain.
2. Have you read, or tried to read, though a portion of Scripture like Joshua 12-21 before? What was that experience like? What are some helpful ways, in the future, to look out for the “big picture” in a passage like this?
3. Who are some “Calebs” or “Joshuas” in your life—men or women who simply took God at His word, regardless of the challenges? How have they inspired your walk of faith?
4. Think of the experience of the Levites in these chapters.
  - a. What might it have been like for them to see their countrymen each receiving their inheritances? What could it have felt like to read these chapters later?
  - b. In what ways does our present experience in the world reflect that of the Levites in Israel?
  - c. Consider the parallels between Joshua 13:33 and Psalm 142:5, 73:26, and Lamentations 3:24 (in their contexts).
  - d. Is there an area or two in your life where it would be helpful or important for you to more intentionally adopt the “Levitical” perspective seen in these passages?
5. Read through Romans 8. Make note of every statement describing our present reality in Christ, and every promise regarding our future.
  - a. Which statements or promises have brought you the most comfort, currently or in the past?
  - b. Which statements or promises have you struggled the most to believe and act on?
  - c. Discuss what it might look like for you to apply Joshua 14:12 or 21:45 to all the promises in Romans 8. Would anything be different in the way you thought, felt, prayed or acted?
  - d. Pray together, asking for the Holy Spirit’s empowerment as you seek to walk by faith in all the promises of God.
